By selling young girls for sex, street hustlers were less likely to get caught. They didn't have to carry the commodity in their pocket or stash it in their homes, as they usually did with crack cocaine. They could use cell phones and laptop connections to the Internet to conduct business with customers while simply posing as boyfriends walking down the street with their girls.... "There is increased economic incentive promoting young men to become involved in pimping," the report said. Applies to every retailer and manufacturer doing business in California w/global gross receipts exceeding \$100 million must disclose on website 32 THE CODE We protect children from CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM sex tourism. SEXUAL EXPLOITATION IN TRAVEL AND TOURISM Six criteria: 1. To establish an ethical policy regarding commercial sexual exploitation of children. To train the personnel in the country of origin and travel destinations. 3. To introduce a clause in contracts with suppliers, stating a common repudiation of commercial sexual exploitation of children. 4. To provide information to travelers by means of catalogues, brochures, in-flight films, ticket-slips, home pages, etc. 5. To provide information to local "key persons" at the destinations. 6. To report annually.
